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# ABRAHAM: THE FATHER OF THE FAITHFUL

#### INTRODUCTION.

- A. Scripture text: **Genesis 26:1-5**.
- B. From Roy H. Enoch (9-13-93).
- C. Today, we are studying Abraham, "the father of all those who believe" (Rom. 4:11):
  - 1. The name "Abram" means "exalted father."
  - 2. It was changed to "Abraham" when he was 99 years old (17:1) which name means "father of many nations" (17:5).
  - 3. It took great faith for Abraham to believe that at the age of 99 with a barren wife that he would be the father of great multitudes.
- D. Abraham is also known as "the friend of God" (Jas. 2:23):
  - This is one of the highest forms of praise given to a man by inspiration.
  - 2. He is "Thy friend forever" (2Chr. 20:7).
  - 3. Isa. 41:8 reminds us that Israel is the chosen nation from Abraham, God's friend.
- E. Reasons that Abraham's faith is given as an example for us to follow:
  - 1. He had the same temptations and difficulties others do.
  - 2. He was told to do very difficult things.
  - 3. He could not understand how many of those things could be done.

## ABRAHAM'S FAITH WAS GREAT IN SPITE OF DIFFICULTIES.

- Abraham had great wealth (13:1-2), which Jesus said made faith difficult (Mt. 19:23, 24): He did not seek wealth.
  - 1. When the herdsmen of Abraham and Lot contended for pasture and water, Abraham told Lot to choose what he wanted; he would take what was left (13:9).
  - 2. When Abraham rescued Lot from Chedorlaomer and the other three kings, the King of Sodom told Abraham to keep the spoil (14:22-23).
- Abraham had weakness at times:
  - In chapters 12 and 20, Abraham was fearful that he would be killed and that his beautiful wife could be taken. He asked her to say that she was his sister.
  - 2. God still protected them both from harm, and both Pharaoh and Abimelech rebuked Abraham for his deception.
- C. Abraham and Sarah had difficulty believing God's promises:
  - We can certainly identify with that.
    - God offers such great blessings, that it seems difficult to realize that they are possible, much less probable.
    - Jack Wilhelm wrote in his newsletter, "We will never know what God can do through us if we only attempt what we think we can do on our own."
  - Some think Abraham showed a lack of faith in (17:15-21).
    - But Abraham did what God said and circumcised all.
    - God did not rebuke Abraham for unbelief as Sarah.
  - Sarah laughed when the Lord appeared as three men (18:12-15).
  - What ever doubt they may have had, it was not enough to keep them from doing what God said (Rom. 4:20-22).
- Abraham lived among people who worshipped idols (31:19; Josh. 24:2).

# ABRAHAM'S FAITH WAS GREAT IN WHAT GOD TOLD HIM TO DO.

- A. He was told to leave his family and homeland (12:1):
  - Stephen said that in Ur of the Chaldeans he was called (Ac. 7:2-3).

- 2. After the death of his father in Haran at the age of 75 God called him again (12:1-3).
- 3. Not knowing where or why he was to go was a great test of his faith.
- 4. But he served God faithfully for another 100 years.
- B. God told him that he would be the father of many nations (12:2-3):
  - 1. The scriptures often mention the difficulty of believing this promise.
  - 2. They describe the struggle Abraham and Sarah had with it.
  - 3. But they never turned from doing what God said.
- C. The greatest test of Abraham's faith was telling him to offer his son Isaac, whom he loved, as a burnt sacrifice to God (22:1-2):
  - 1. Abraham did not waver or hesitate at the command.
  - 2. He made preparations and arose early the next morning and went the 3 day journey.
  - 3. Isaac is described as "the lad" or "the boy" (22:5).
    - a. The next event mentioned in Isaac's life was the death of his mother, when he was 37. He married Rebekah when he was 40.
    - b. Josephus supposed that he was 25, and some Rabbis that he was 35. Adam Clark prefers 33 (the age of God's Son when He was sacrificed).
    - c. Isaac seemed to show as much faith and submission as his father.
  - 4. God describes Abraham's obedience as proof of faith (22:11-12).

# III. ABRAHAM'S FAITH WAS GREAT BECAUSE HE DID NOT UNDERSTAND THE WHY OR HOW OF WHAT GOD TOLD HIM TO DO.

- A. God did not tell him **why** he was to leave his family.
- B. He did not tell him **where** he was going, or **why** he was to go.
- C. He could not know why he was to offer his son:
  - 1. Isaac was the heir of promise, that through his seed all nations would be blessed.
  - 2. Through Isaac would come many nations.
  - 3. God reveals through inspiration to the Hebrew writer that Abraham believed that God would raise him from the dead (Heb. 11:17-19).
- D. Neither Abraham nor his descendants could know that "thy seed" referred to the Messiah rather than his descendants:
  - 1. The Jews thought they were "the seed of Abraham" and God's blessing to the world.
  - 2. Only by inspiration could Paul affirm X as the seed, to the Galatians (Gal. 3:16).
- E. Sometimes we also wonder about God's revelation and wish for a greater understanding.

### CONCLUSION AND INVITATION.

- A. Studying the faith of Abraham, we are amazed at such trust in view of the circumstances.
- B. He had the same temptations we have, with less revelation of God's will.
- C. He was told to do many great and difficult things.
- D. He did not understand why or how he was to do them.
- E. Saving faith does not have to know why God tells us to do the things commanded, nor how we will be able to accomplish them. It is a trust that will try w/complete confidence and our greatest effort of faith.
- F. Plan of salvation for non-Xians, erring Xians.
